The provincial representatives in each discipline compete, culminating in a final Grand Award Competition on August 12th, where a first prize of \$5,000 and second prize of \$2,500 will be awarded to the top two competitors.

# **Public Relations Workshop**

On the evening of Tuesday August 9, Competitors will be treated to a Public Relations workshop presented by Liz Parker of LIZPR. This workshop on marketing, public relations and dressing for success will help prepare them to take the next steps towards professionalism.

The LIZPR workshop for the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals will entail the students learning how to present themselves in various ways:

-online (their websites, and how they must function for promotional purposes) -social media (why it's really not a great idea to post photos of drinking games on your Instagram)

-appearance (what to wear for photo shoots, onstage, and at events)

-in writing (the bio – how to write them, how to edit them)

General networking tips will be included as well. (She may actually test your handshake to see if it leaves a good impression.)

Competitors are encouraged to prepare some questions (no query is too shallow – no judgement!) and to have their smart phones on hand. Obviously, Liz will check out what you're wearing.

# University of Ottawa's School of Music

The School of Music at the University of Ottawa is one of the country's leading music schools. It's the ideal place to nurture your passion for all things musical and to pursue the rigorous training needed for an active and successful career in the field. We maintain close ties with renowned institutions such as the Ottawa Symphony Orchestra and the National Arts Centre (NAC). Our program boasts state-of-the-art music facilities and internationally recognized professors who perform around the globe and publish in leading academic journals. We are a full-service music school offering programs in performance, composition, education, piano pedagogy, musicology and theory.

# Pérez Hall

Practice rooms and three of the performance venues are housed in Pérez Hall, the home of uOttawa's Department of Music. The welcome kiosk will be located here as well, just inside these front doors.

Pérez Hall, named for its largest private contributor, was inaugurated in the summer of 1988. It houses the university's Department of Music, which for many years was sorely in need of space. The building, linked by an elevated pedestrian walkway to Morisset Hall, has its own music library, practice rooms, auditorium and underground parking garage. It is home to the Piano Pedagogy Research Laboratory, a state-of-the-art facility that makes it possible to measure specific visual or auditory phenomena involved in the complex activity of learning to play the piano.

# Huguette Labelle Hall, Tabaret Hall

The beautiful and historic Huguette Labelle Hall, located in Tabaret Hall, is the fourth performance venue and the venue for the Grand Award Competition. Tabaret Hall is approximately a 3-minute walk from Pérez Hall.

The university's logo was inspired by the huge columns at the front entrance of Tabaret Hall. The Hall was built in several stages: after the main building was erected in 1905, additional wings were added in 1914, 1922 and 1931. The architect, A. O. Von Herbulis, from New York, based his design on the Capitol Building in Washington. Its classic architecture, monolithic columns and ornate trim give the building its special character.

The building was given its name in 1971 to honour Father Joseph-Henri Tabaret, OMI, considered the "builder" of the institution. During the 1800s, Father Tabaret was the driving force behind the university for

over 30 years, and it was under his leadership that Bytown College became an official university.

Huguette Hall Room 112 of Tabaret Hall is, without a doubt, the most beautiful room at the University of Ottawa. Indeed, this large space, which served many years as a chapel, is unique, with its high, artfully decorated ceiling, its pilasters and its beautiful stained glass windows. It is named after Huguette Labelle who served as Chancellor of the university for 18 years.

This distinguished Franco-Ontarian, was recipient of several degrees from the University, very active on campus, and held many important positions in the public service and with international organizations.

## **Resignation of Jerry Lonsbury**

In early February, President Jerry Lonsbury sent a letter of resignation to the FCMF 2016 AGM delegates. He resigned due to pending knee-replacement surgeries with significant recovery periods that would preclude him for being able to attend the 2017 National Music Festival. The FCMF Executive accepted his resignation with regret, but understanding. We wish him a speedy recovery in the months ahead.

Some parting thoughts from Jerry ....

"Although still some months away, the upcoming Annual General Meeting of the Federation may well determine the future course of the Federation. There will be some tough issues to address. The Da Capo committee, authorized by the 2015 AGM, proposed a new governance structure for the Federation which the delegates accepted in principle. The Da Capo committee continues to work on the concept in an effort to present ammended Bylaws to support the new model, to be voted on at the AGM. The committee remains very aware that changes must be made in a manner acceptable to Canada Revenue Agency to maintain our status as a registered charitable organization.

Working through the new model has also provided an opportunity to discuss how the Federation, through any number of initiatives, could make itself more relevant to local and provincial festivals. Could a more cohesive organization fare better at attracting significant financial support through government or business? What can the Federation do to make itself more relevant to local festivals? While the Federation is keenly aware that without the continuing committed dedication of countless volunteers in hundreds of local festivals, and indeed the participants in those festivals, there would be no need for a Federation and its prime directive to organize an annual National Music Festival.

In this year of the 50th anniversary of a National Music Festival, we need to celebrate the past and, with care and dedication preserve traditions, while simultaneously embarking in new directions that acknowledge that the music community, like all other societal organizations, must be cognizant of rapidly changing environment."

The FCMF is anticipating many changes in 2017. As I read through correspondence, there is a sense of optimism for the *new* ideas that have come forward through individuals and committee work.

Change can be challenging, but also it can be a great opportunity. Let us work together, with Canadian pride, as we uphold the FCMF Mission Statement:

- The FCMF Executive has held monthly Teleconference Meetings with minutes being distributed to the Provincial Administrators.
- The Da Capo Committee conducted a survey on various options that had been discussed in relation to moving forward on the new governance model. There was a lot of agreement on all issues. Some fine-tuning of options remains and is underway.
- Proposed ByLaw changes to reflect the new governance model are scheduled to be distributed to Provincial Associations by the middle of May.
- A preliminary discussion with Canada Revenue Office was very encouraging. We are able to submit proposed ByLaw changes for "pre-approval" before

the AGM so that they can ask for clarification or make suggestions for delegates to discuss at the AGM. Changes adopted at the AGM can become effective that day, with or with-out "pre-approval".

- The new Policy & Procedure Manual is nearing completition and will be distributed to Provincial Associations by the middle of May.
- There are competitor and delegate lounge options in the 90U residence.
- 2018 National Music Festival will be held in Sackville, NB on the campus of Mount Allison University.
- Competitor and Delgate registration will be an online process through the FCMF website.

From the History Book ...

# Celebrating 50th Anniversary of the National Centennial Festival of Music



The Federation of Canadian Music Festivals is a grass-roots organization that identifies, encourages and develops Canada's young classical musicians through our ten provincial associations and our approximately 230 local festivals. All festivals are run primarily by volunteers.

As Canada celebrates its 150<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2017, the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals will also be proudly celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the National Centennial Festival of Music, held in Saint John, New Brunswick in 1967. This festival was a significant milestone in our national festival movement and became a model for the development of the National Music Festival that we know today.

The FCMF has had a history of cultural stewardship across Canada dating back to the days of Earl Grey and Wilfrid Laurier. Thanks to a countless number of dedicated volunteers and with an existing infrastructure of approximately 250 local festivals, 10 provincial festivals and the National Music Festival, the FCMF is well positioned to continue, indeed expand, its support of amateur music performance, education and training from the grassroots to elite levels in communities nationwide. We are very proud of the fact that local communities provide the foundation for the work of the Federation.

# FCMF's National Centennial Music Festival, 1967 in Saint John, NB

Taken from The Road to Excellence: History of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals by Valerie Verity

"In January, 1966 a bulletin from Richard Cooke to the affiliated festivals announced that the Centennial Commission had awarded a grant of \$61,000.00 for the festival project, to be staged in New Brunswick during July, 1967. Fortunately the Federation was prepared to respond quickly since Mossie Hancock's plans for the festival were complete, while Isabel Heatherington did the French translation of materials. E.G. Pridham and Claude Deschamps were named as Co-Chairmen of the Centennial Festival of Music/Le festival de musique du Centenaire.

"What a wave of excitement swept through the Canadian festival movement upon hearing the good news. Rumor had it that such eminent musicians as Aaron Copland, Leonard Bernstein and Samuel Barber would be serving as judges. Even Madame Leontyne Price from the Metropolitan Opera would be coming to New Brunswick, it was rumored. ...

"When the "Centenary Festival of Music" was held in July 1967 in Saint John, New Brunswick, there were five competitive areas at the senior level: woodwinds, brass, strings, voice and piano. Solo competition at the junior level and classes for bands and orchestras were held provincially, all judged by three travelling adjudicators. Goldschmidt also got his way, for a Choral competition was held outside the purview of the Federation. It was even planned that the Queen Mother might be present in Saint John for this auspicious occasion. Saskatchewan's Mossie Hancock, one of the instrument organizers, was caught up in the excitement of the event:

Those of us who attended the Saint John Centenary Festival will never forget it. In every way (it was) an exhilarating experience. For the first time ever, the remarkable talent of young Canadian musicians was in one centre for three days. To hear the best from every province in the Finals was to hold for a precious time a real sense of promise, a promise of a future in music that was completely and unmistakably Canadian.

"The experience of organizing this first-ever national festival would prove invaluable. Richard Cooke recognized the special contribution of three of his peers in making that first festival so successful. Saskatchewan's Gordon Hancock made a "considerable contribution", while Hilda Guy, a vice-president of the Federation, was the site organizer. But it was E.G. Pridham who was central to the success of the event. His "unfailing patience, sympathetic understanding and unlimited hours devoted to the cause" were essentials.

"As for Pridham himself, he saw only good resulting from the tremendous effort:

One thing the Centenary Festival did was to bring the members of the Federation closer together in a cooperative effort to develop a strong festival movement. It provided us with a wonderful opportunity to work had in hand with many non-affiliated festivals. I sincerely hope we will not lose these valuable contacts as we can learn so much from each other by sharing our experiences."

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
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
