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The FCMF Executive is excited about the 2018 National Music Festival being hosted by the New Brunswick Federation of Music Festivals on the beautiful campus of Mount Allison University from August 12-16th.

Each year the National Music Festival brings together the best classical music students from every province, to perform in the top venues in the country, to interact and hear and learn from each other, to have workshop sessions with Canada's best adjudicators, and to compete for the top festival prizes in Canada. It is a truly unique Festival that enriches the lives of both performers and audiences alike!

The provincial representatives in each discipline compete, culminating in a final Grand Award Competition on August 16th, where a first prize of \$5,000 and second prize of \$2,500 will be awarded to the top two competitors.

Following the competitions, the Annual Conference will be held on August 17th and 18th, with the Annual General Meeting on the afternoon of August 18th. Join us in Sackville!

#### Welcome BBQ

#### Why Do We Make Music? - Presentation by Dr. Gregory Burton

Following the Competitor Briefing at 7 PM, Dr. Gregory Burton will speak to the competitors on the question, "Why do we make music?" Having worked as a successful performing symphony musician, conductor, teacher and arts administrator for the past 40 years, Dr. Burton will discuss with festival participants the fundamental question of why so many people love to make music in all of its various forms, how music expresses the most personal of thoughts and why it is so important that accomplished musicians share their gifts in their communities. Dr. Burton will discuss attributes a professional musician must possess such as flexibility, preparedness, diversity, passion, generosity and a dedication to life-long learning.



#### Dr. Gregory Burton

After living for 13 years in the GTA, Greg Burton is happy to be enjoying the east coast lifestyle again. He teaches in the Music Department of Mount Allison University where he is currently conductor of the University Chamber Orchestra and delivers courses in Music Education and Conducting.

Greg was an active conductor, performer and teacher while in the greater Toronto area having been Music Director of the York Symphony Orchestra, Halton-Mississauga Youth Orchestra, the University of Toronto Wind Ensemble and the McMaster University Chamber Orchestra. He performed with and guest

conducted the Niagara Symphony, and was Director of Arts at Hillfield Strathallan College in Hamilton, Ontario.

Prior to his work in Ontario, Greg was a regular conductor and performer with Symphony Nova Scotia, the Nova Scotia Youth Orchestra and a faculty member at Acadia University.

#### Dinner Theatre

The annual Fun Night for competitors and their families, accompanists and delegates is a Dinner Theatre written and performed by Scott and Irma Mulherin of *Broadway Productions*, for the 2018 National Music Festival and Annual Conference.

Broadway Productions is a music school and theatre production company based out of Grand Falls, New Brunswick. The company specializes in youth and community theatre as well as original musical comedies and dinner theatres for all occasions. They are the recipient of numerous awards, including New Brunswick's Young Entrepreneur award and most recently Business of the Year for their region. Broadway Productions is excited to be participating in the 2018 National Music Festival in Sackville with the original show "EAST COAST OPRY LIVE" starring owners Scott and Irma Mulherin. ## **Competition Venues**

#### Mount Allison University

The focus of Mount Allison's musical activity is the **Marjorie Young Bell Conservatory of Music**, which was opened in 1966 and which provides outstanding facilities for the Music department. The building houses studios and offices, practice rooms, ensemble rehearsal rooms, a computer lab, classrooms, the music library, and separate choral and instrumental music collections. It is also home to the 314-seat Brunton Auditorium performance hall.

The recently expanded Alfred Whitehead Memorial Music Library holds thousands of books, recordings, videos, scores, and periodicals, as well as listening, video-viewing, and study areas. The University has an outstanding collection of special instruments including two Casavant organs, two harpsichords, two 9' Yamaha concert grand pianos, as well as numerous other instruments. Practice and performance facilities are readily accessible to music students.

**Brunton Auditorium** and the **Band Room** will be two of the performance venues for the competitions.

The "Conserv" is like a school within a school, and there is great camaraderie among faculty and students. The Conservatory is truly the "home away from home" for our students.



#### The Mount Allison Chapel

Built in 1964 through the generous gifts of alumni and supporters of the University, the Chapel is maintained by a full-time University chaplain. The Mount Allison Chapel is home to denominationally-inclusive religious observances during term time, and is occasionally used for specific rites such as funerals and weddings.



The sanctuary is built on a equilateral cruciform plan, giving a sense of squareness rather than the usual elongated nave that separates people at the back from the liturgical activity at the front.

Acoustically, the Chapel is pure and resonant. A frequentlyused site for concerts, the shape of the Chapel brings the audience into closer proximity with the performers.

#### Motyer-Fancy Theatre

The 100-seat Motyer-Fancy Theatre is housed in the new Purdy Crawford Centre for the Arts and is home to the University's drama program as well as a valuable community resource. One of the top arts education facilities in the country, Mount Allison's new Purdy Crawford Centre for the Arts provides specialized facilities for teaching, performance, and creative pursuits in Fine Arts and Drama. It is named in honour of the late Purdy Crawford (Class of '52, LLD '91) — Mount Allison graduate, chancellor emeritus, and prominent Canadian businessman and philanthropist.





The theatre was named in honour of Dr. Arthur Motyer and Prof. Alex Fancy, both alumni and professor *emeriti* of drama.

The Motyer-Fancy Theatre combines many old and new features with sophisticated sound and lighting equipment, as well as additional space for teaching and collaboration. The walls of the theatre are made of recycled wood, giving a unique look to the facility.

## **Accommodation Options**

Attendees at the 2018 National Music Festival and Annual Conference have accommodation options at different price points. A block of rooms has been reserved in both locations. Choose what works best for you!

#### Campbell Hall Residence - Mount Allison University



Campbell Hall is located on campus, next door to Jennings Dining Hall and Harper Hall [location for conference and AGM], and a short walk [3-5 minutes] to the music conservatory and other performance venues.

It offers single ensuite [shared bathroom with room next door] for \$48.50 +15% HST = \$55.76 per night.

There are a few double ensuite rooms - \$75 + 15% HST = \$86.25 per night.

#### Coastal Inn

The Coastal Inn is located at 15 Wright Street, Sackville. It is approximately 1.3 km [16 minute walk] from music conservatory, performance venues, dining hall and meeting room for Conference and AGM. They offer rooms with 1 queen bed or 2 double beds for \$99 + 15% HST = \$113.85 per night. ## Meal Plan Option

#### Campus Meal Plan

A Campus Meal Plan option has been arranged since there are far fewer restaurant options in Sackville than Ottawa and Edmonton. Many of the available restaurants are downtown, only a few-minutes' walk from campus, while the remainder are very close to Coastal Inn.

Meal plans will be purchased in advance through link on the FCMF website to Mount Allison Conference Services. You are encouraged to purchase a meal plan.

The meal plans includes the Welcome BBQ for Sunday dinner. It does not include Wednesday dinner as we will be off campus for the Dinner Theatre Fun Night.

Jennings Dining Hall is in the same cul-de-sac as Campbell Hall Residence and Harper Hall. Those with meal plans will have a selection of options to choose from. Dietary restrictions and food allergies are accommodated when noted in advance.

From Sunday Welcome BBQ dinner through Thursday dinner [excluding Wednesday dinner] the cost for all meals is \$122 + 15% HST = \$140.30 which works out to just over \$35 per day.

Individual meal tickets can be purchased in advance at the following rates:

- o Breakfast \$7.53 + 15% = \$8.66 per meal
- o Lunch \$11.28 + 15% HST = \$12.97 per meal
- o Dinner \$15.05 + 15% HST = \$17.31 per meal

A limited number of meal tickets will also be available on-site at a higher cost.



### **Travel Information**

#### Air Travel

When booking flights for the 2018 National Music Festival in Sackville, NB, the closest airport is Moncton, NB.

This year we are able to offer discount codes from Air Canada [10%] and West Jet [15%] on eligible flights which will hopefully help your travel costs. The codes will be posted on the FCMF website and will work for flights between anywhere in North America and Moncton. Please be aware that there may be less expensive flights through a seat sale than with the code.





#### Ground Travel - Moncton to Sackville

Sackville is 42 kms from the Moncton airport. An airport shuttle service has been arranged with Unique Car Service in Monction, NB. There will be instructions and reservation code on the FCMF website for you to book and pay for this service directly. The cost is \$28.75 including tax, per person, per direction [Moncton -Sackville and returning, Sackville - Moncton].

### **Tourist Information**

#### Waterfowl Park

While Sackville's parks, trails and nature preserves are some of the best in the world, the crown jewel is the Sackville Waterfowl Park. This award-winning 55-acre park, which is minutes from the highway and a short walk from downtown, features:

- 3.5 kilometres of accessible trails and boardwalks, including a section of the Trans-Canada Trail
- 160 bird species (including 26 confirmed breeding species)
- 200 species of plants
- Free admission
- Guided tours May to August
- Self-guided tour map
- Accessible via the Trans-Canada trail

**Tantramar Wetlands Centre** - This unique indoor and outdoor facility offers the opportunity to experinece wetlands by participating in innovative educational programs.

Tantramar Rail Trail - links Sackville with the Village of Port Elgin following the route of the Trans-Canada/New Brunswick Trail eastward.

Bill Johnstone Memorial Park - situated in the heart of downtown Sackville; includes a



splash park, playground, tennis courts, basketball court, bandstand, activity centre, an artistic fountain.

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## From the History Book



The FCMF and NBFMF history books give insight into previous national events held in New Brunswick.

#### 1967 The First National Music Festival - Saint John, NB

► Excerpts taken from *The Road to Excellence: History of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals* by Valerie Verity

"In January, 1966 a bulletin from Richard Cooke to the affiliated festivals announced that the Centennial Commission had awarded a grant of \$61,000.00 for the festival project,

to be staged in New Brunswick during July, 1967. Fortunately the Federation was prepared to respond quickly since Mossie Hancock's plans for the festival were complete, while Isabel Heatherington did the French translation of materials. E.G. Pridham and Claude Deschamps were named as Co-Chairmen of the Centennial Festival of Music/Le festival de musique du Centenaire."

"When the "Centenary Festival of Music" was held in July 1967 in Saint John, New Brunswick, there were five competitive areas at the senior level: woodwinds, brass, strings, voice and piano. Solo competition at the junior level and classes for bands and orchestras were held provincially, all judged by three travelling adjudicators. Goldschmidt also got his way, for a Choral competition was held outside the purview of the Federation. It was even planned that the Queen Mother might be present in Saint John for this auspicious occasion. Saskatchewan's Mossie Hancock, one of the instrument organizers, was caught up in the excitement of the event:

Those of us who attended the Saint John Centenary Festival will never forget it. In every way (it was) an exhilarating experience. For the first time ever, the remarkable talent of young Canadian musicians was in one centre for three days. To hear the best from every province in the Finals was to hold for a precious time a real sense of promise, a promise of a future in music that was completely and unmistakably Canadian."

#### 1976 National Annual Conference - Sackville, NB

From 1976 - 1983, the National Music Festival and the National Annual Conference were held at different times, and in different locations. The FCMF President in 1976 was Mrs. Jean Crittal of Ontario.

Excerpts taken from FESTIVALS: A History of Competitive Music Festivals in New Brunswick 1935-2007 by Gail Carleton

"The 1970's once again brought the national festival organization to New Brunswick. In 1976, the Annual Conference of FCMF was held at Mount Allison University. It was a 3-day event organized under the leadership of Margaret Grant of Sackville who later became president of NBFMF. Unfortunately, there was a strike of airline pilots which prevented or delayed many delegates from across Canada being able to get to Sackville. Gordon Hancock from Regina, a former FCMF President, and Dr. Bona from Saint John, an Area Director, were there, so meetings could get started while waiting for others to arrive. At this meeting an important proposal was put forward: to combine the annual Conference with the National Festival instead of organizing separate events at different places and different times of the years. Eventually this came about, although not until 1984.

"The Sackville Music Festival committee supported their President, Mrs. Grant, in organizing the conference. The New Brunswick government offered \$1,500, to pay for a banquet for delegates and other guests. Stanislas Paulin from Saint John, a well-known tenor at Mount Allison Conservatory, was the guest soloist. The NBFMF was represented at the conference by its President, Dr. Bona, Secretary, Hectorine Lauzier and Treasurer, Millicent Kavanaugh. Hadley Wood, Chair of the NBFMF finance committee, also attended the conference as a representative of Bathurst Music Festival. He was given authority to "deal conclusively with the subject of affiliation fees which will be discussed thoroughly at the meeting."

It was at this annual conference that affiliation fees paid to FCMF by a provincial association were changed from a flat fee of \$175 per year to a per-entry model based on the previous years' number of festival entries. For 1977, the fee was set at 6 cents per entry.

Editor's note: In future issues, the 1985, 1996 and 2007 National Music Festival and Annual Conferences, hosted by the New Brunswick Federation of Music Festivals, will be highlighted.
