Presentation by Mark Turner

On Wednesday, August 7, competitors will have the opportunity to listen to and interact with Mark Turner of the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra about the next steps in their career development. The lecture and Q&A session will be presented twice during the day of Official Rehearsals.

The Industry and the Exponential Musician - Career Development for Emerging Classical Artists

The next generation of classical artist has completely different expectations of what they want from their career, and often times they finish their training ready to jump into an industry they haven't had a chance to interact with yet. Mark Turner shares insight on what presenters are looking for, how to make yourself an asset to the industry, and what it means to be an exponential musician in the 21st century.

Mark Turner is the Executive Director of the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra. Under his leadership the orchestra has seen transformative change to become one of the most innovative orchestras in the country. The SSO's dedication and commitment to Canadian artists and composers, both established and emerging, is a trademark of their desire to help define the modern era of classical music. Mark serves the Canadian orchestral community, currently as a founding member of the IDEA committee (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Access) and as delegate to many international conferences. His career includes work as collaborative pianist, artistic director, producer, radio host, consultant, educator, and competition juror. Mark's work as producer has included collaborations with Jan Lisiecki, Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra, Isabel Bayrakdarian, James Ehnes, Tanya Tagaq, Sara Sleam, Vince Mendoza and many more.

This dinner is an opportunity to recognize the Federation's Outstanding Volunteers, as nominated by provincial associations. First and Second Place Choral awards will also be presented to attending winning directors.

There will be light entertainment provided by some of the adjudicators with SK roots in celebration of the Saskatchewan Music Festivals Association's 110th Anniversary.

Zuick Facts from the National Office

- The FCMF Executive held monthly Tele-conference Meetings with minutes being distributed to the Provincial Administrators.
- The competitor lounge in the Student Education Building is generously sponsored by RBC Dominion Securities Inc. [Frank Wade, MB].
- Attendees at the 2019 National Conference and Music Festival include: 49 Solo Competitors including 2 percussionists who submitted recordings, 2 Chamber Trio Ensembles, 13 Accompanists and 22 Delegates.
- There were 33 Choirs entered in the 2019 National Music Festival Choral Competition.
- 2020 National Music Festival will be held at Mount Allison University in Sackville, NB.
- FCMF hired two summer students under the federal

- Canada Summer Jobs program. After conducting interviews, Olivia Adams was hired for 16 weeks as Administrative and Marketing Assistant. Solveig Deason was hired for 10 weeks as Archival and Research Assistant. The grants are worth a total of \$11,668, with no cost to FCMF. Both girls are from Saskatoon as per grant requirements.
- FCMF participated in ArtsVest, Business/Arts signature
 mentorship training program designed to build
 capacity in Canada's cultural sector. Artsvest provides
 small to mid-sized arts and culture organizations with
 resources, expertise and training in marketing, board
 governance and sponsorship along with matching
 incentive funds and peer-to-peer networking.
- The new advertising and Adjudicator Alumni Award initiatives were well-received.





The network of volunteers in the music festival system is the heart and lifeblood of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals (FCMF) and our provincial members across Canada. These dedicated people truly believe in the adage: "Work for the cause, not the applause."

The excellence of our volunteers has, and will continue to drive FCMF's success.

According to the FCMF's history book <u>The Road to Excellence – Volume 1</u>, the early years (1908-1949) of the music festival movement began in Western Canada. 1949-1967 were exciting as the FCMF emerged in its present shape: "and did much to coordinate the activities of the local and provincial organizations which made up its membership."

In 1967, the planning and organizing of a national music festival brought about dramatic change. The immense time and effort invested by volunteers made the first National Competitive Festival of Music in 1972 a reality. Since that time National Music Festivals have been held in various locations from coast to coast which is further evidence of our strong volunteer base.

This brings us to 2019 when we look back on 47 consecutive years of National Music Festivals. In the past 5 years, the National Music Festival has grown to include the

Musical Theatre discipline, performance opportunities with orchestras for the Grand Award winner, longer Masterclasses for all competitors in the National Music Festival, and work being done to include Band and Orchestra competitions in the future.

Performance Opportunities

The FCMF is very pleased to have Memorandums of Understanding with the Prince George Symphony Orchestra in BC and the Thunder Bay Symphony Orchestra in Ontario. These agreements provide for the Grand Award Winner at the 2019 National Music Festival to have a performance opportunity with the Symphony Orchestras in an upcoming season.

Details of the Prizes:

- The winner of the 2019 Grand Award shall be presented in an upcoming season.
- The orchestras will communicate directly with the GA Winner to determine repertoire for the performance. Repertoire may be chosen from the GA Winner's repertoire of the 2019 National Music Festival or as agreed upon by the orchestras
- The orchestras will assist the emerging artist to develop a media kit, including appropriate biographies and other materials as needed, as well as work with the artist to prepare for media interviews and their publicity surrounding the performance.
- The in-kind value of the performances is \$3,000; this includes in-kind value of the performance fee, flight transportation to and from the performance, ground transportation, hotel accommodations for the duration of the engagement, and time developing media/marketing with the artist.

Providing leadership in music education across Canada



Tracy Dahl

Canadian coloratura soprano, Tracy Dahl C.M., is known for her vocal agility, range and dramatic prowess. Alongside her impressive performing career she is a Professor of Voice at the University of Manitoba and visiting instructor for the Emerging Young Artist Program with Calgary Opera as well as guest masterclasses for voice all over North America. She has appeared with such esteemed opera companies as the Metropolitan, San Francisco, Houston Grand, Santa Fe, Calgary operas, the Canadian Opera Company, Pacific Opera Victoria, Teatro alla Scala (Milan), Hamburg Opera and the Théâtre du Châtelet (Paris). Equally at home on the concert stage she has performed in recitals and in orchestral works ranging from Gershwin to Bach.

Her operatic career began as Barbarina in Mozart's *Le nozze di Figaro* with the Manitoba Opera where she performed many roles in her career. She credits her beginnings in musical theatre at the Manitoba Theatre Centre and work in theatre was setting her apart in the world of opera. In July 2017, Tracy Dahl had the high honour of being appointed to the Order of Canada for her accomplishments as an opera singer and for her commitment to mentoring the next generation of Canadian singers.

"The impact of the National Music Festival on my career is probably more important than most could or would imagine. It was at the National Music Festival when the adjudicator invited several of the competitors to attend a seminar in New York City that coming September. The gentleman ran a summer program in Graz Austria and was having a seminar for young singers. Two of the singers decided to take advantage of his invitation and went. It was at this seminar that I sang in a session called, "Would I hire you?" I was a naïve young singer, running on enthusiasm and passion for singing. I had no idea who I was singing for. The three gentlemen on the panel were all extremely influential people in the world of opera. Two of them continued to be important in my career after that day and one said, "Would I hire you? Yes, I have a job for you. Speak to me at the end of the session." It was my debut with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in Toronto and at Carnegie Hall in New York City. I suppose some people might call this a version of 'six degrees of separation' where a festival in Winnipeg led to the Provincials, to the Nationals in Regina, to a NY seminar to Carnegie Hall! The level of singing was amazing the year I competed at Nationals and the top three singers, all females that year, went on to international careers; Kathleen Brett, myself and Lyne Fortin. I feel very blessed that I was there that summer and made the connections that I did. I am ever so grateful for my years in the local music festival and my teacher, his wife - my pianist - and the friends I made during that time."

Festivals Celebrating Anniversaries

Provincial Associations were invited to submit the names and some information about their local festivals that were celebrating anniversaries in 2019. The following submissions were received:

British Columbia

Cowichan Music Festival - 70 years

Cowichan Music Festival, located in Duncan, BC is celebrating 70 years. Originally a music only festival, dance is now a large part of this festival. A few long-standing volunteers make sure that this festival continues to take place for the youth of the Cowichan Valley. Cowichan Festival hosted the 2010 BC Provincial Festival.

Powell River Festival - 75 years

Powell River Festival of the Performing Arts is celebrating it's 75th anniversary this year. Founded as a music only festival, dance has recently been added. Community groups in Powell River are strong supporters of this festival, especially the local Rotary Club. Powell River hosted the 2015 BC Provincial Festival.

Saskatchewan

Potashville Music Festival - 50 years

Potashville Music Festival rotates between the communities of Langenburg, Churchbridge and Esterhazy, and celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2019, in Langenburg. Many adjudicators and teachers, over fifty years, influenced participants to continue performing throughout their lives. Potashville is one of the earliest in the Saskatchewan festival season. which can leave it vulnerable to the mercy of prairie winter weather, but this year the four-day festival ran smoothly and without interference. 154 entries were heard, with strong participation from school bands and instrumentalists. The 50th anniversary Awards Night Gala was concluded by serving coffee and cake to an appreciative audience. The festival will move to Churchbridge in 2020.

Estevan & District Music Festival 55 years

Estevan is currently one of the larger District Festivals in Saskatchewan, with 588 entries in its 55th year. The 2019 festival ran over twelve days, with four adjudicators. School bands are a strong component of the festival, and as a result, nearly 1600 musicians participated in this year's festival. Speech arts is also well represented, typically including choral speech entries in French. The scholarship list is one of the most generous in the province, and this year, 135 scholarships were awarded at a value of \$10,850.

Last Mountain & District Music Festival – 55 years

Last Mountain & District Music
Festival is truly a co-operative
enterprise, with four centres in
its current rotation: Raymore,
Strasbourg, Earl Grey and Southey.
Each community hosts the festival
for two consecutive years. The 55th
annual festival was held in Raymore,
with 140 entries heard by two
adjudicators over four days. Entries
were primarily in piano and voice, as
well as a few entries in school band,
strings and guitar. The festival will
move to Strasbourg in 2020 and 2021.

Carnduff & District Music and Arts Festival – 60 years

Carnduff & District Music and Arts Festival celebrated its 60th anniversary with a six-day festival, in which more than 300 performances were heard by three adjudicators in the following disciplines: piano, strings (violin and fiddle), guitar, bands and band instruments, vocal, musical theatre and speech arts.

Carnduff has been blessed with excellent teachers, strong leaders and hardworking volunteers. Their festival is preceded by an annual Strawberry Tea, which helps to raise the profile of the music festival in the community and gives the students an opportunity to perform prior to the festival. Over the years, Carnduff Festival has enjoyed good support from school entries and Music for Young Children.

Kipling & District Music Festival 65 years

The program cover for the 2019 Kipling & District Music Festival reads "65 Years of Showcasing Talent", and in accordance with the custom of many years, also showcases the artistic talent of a young local artist. From its beginning in 1955 with a one-day festival and one adjudicator, Kipling grew to an eight-day festival in 1989, remarkable for a town with a population of around 1,000 residents and thanks to the participation of surrounding communities. The 2019 festival was held over five days, with three adjudicators hearing 235 entries, 65 of which were in speech arts. Anniversary cake was served following the final awards program, in celebration of this milestone year.

Moose Jaw Music Festival 70 years

Moose Jaw Festival celebrated its 70th anniversary in 2019, beginning with a two-day choral festival involving eleven choirs. The choral discipline is non-competitive and each choir receives a workshop-style adjudication. Over six additional days, 418 entries were heard by adjudicators in the following disciplines: vocal, musical theatre, strings, band and piano. Moose Jaw and surrounding area is blessed with excellent teachers and is typically well-represented at Provincial Finals. The City of Moose Jaw hosted

the 2019 SMFA Provincial Finals Competitions in the Mae Wilson Theatre, St. Andrew's United Church, Zion United Church and the Public Library Art Museum Theatre.

Shaunavon & District Music Festival – 85 years

Shaunavon & District Music Festival celebrated its 85th anniversary in 2019, with a four-day festival, in which two adjudicators heard over 130 entries. Fourteen teachers/ music directors prepared and entered their students in disciplines of piano, strings, vocal, choral and musical theatre. Speech arts has also gained in popularity in recent years. In 2019, thirty-three scholarships were awarded by the adjudicators, in the amount of \$3,925. Quoting President Nancy Phillips: "Several things have changed through the years, but the love, dedication and support in the southwest has not wavered."

Rosetown & District Music Festival 90 years

Quoting from President Carmen Ledding's message in the Rosetown festival program: "It is hard to believe that we are celebrating 90 years of Rosetown and District Music Festival. So much has changed from our first festival in 1929, when musicians travelled by special train to perform in Kerrobert. Our festival has persevered through the Great Depression, wartime, drought, and numerous societal changes. The joy and tradition of music which has been inspired by notable early teachers (such as Julia Graham and Iola Arthur) continues to be an inspiration in Rosetown today. We still join together in December to take part in our annual Carol Festival and look forward to all the new performers who entertain us at Music Festival in March. It is easy to see how the dedication of volunteers, the encouragement of teachers, and the talents of students have made music in Rosetown a priority in spite of hardship."

Swift Current & District Music Festival – 90 years

Swift Current & District Music Festival celebrated 90 years of festivals, and long history of involvement with SMFA, in 2019. The Swift Current Festival began in 1930, but throughout the 1920s, their musicians journeyed to the cities taking the Provincial Festival in turn. Since 1930, the Swift Current Festival has carried on without a break. It limped a few times during the Depression, drought, and WWII, but carry on it did. In 2019, the festival was held over ten days, with six adjudicators and included eight workshops. The scholarship list is long and generous: 68 scholarships were awarded to participants, totalling over \$5,000.







Ontario

Lambton County Music Festival 90 years

2019 marks the 90th anniversary of the Lambton County Music Festival. The Festival has the distinction of being the longest running independent competitive Music Festival in Canada! The first Festival was held in 1930 in the ballroom of the Fairbanks Mansion in Petrolia, Ontario (North American Oil Pioneer). The Festival continues today held at various venues in Sarnia-Lambton. The Fairbanks family continue to support the Festival along with a number of other very generous patrons and monetary award sponsors. The goal of the Festival is to foster excellence in the performance of music and to provide participants with awards and scholarships to encourage them to continue their musical studies. Lambton County Music Festival is a proud member of the Ontario Music Festivals Association.



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The Canadian Music Festival Adjudicators Association (CMFAA) would like to thank the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals for giving us this opportunity to update the avid supporters of the music festival movement across Canada on the directions in which we are moving. Over the past year, the CMFAA has been consulting those involved in the festival movement regarding new ways to better serve both our membership of fine adjudicator and the festival movement.

Here are some details of what we have been doing.

- 1) A new initiative is our Adjudicator Travel Assistance Program. This program is specifically designed to get our extremely qualified adjudicators further afield from larger centres and into areas of the country which are more likely to struggle to pay travel costs bringing in qualified adjudicators for their local festivals. Just as it is valuable for local students to have the input of our professionals from further away, there is also a value to our professionals in their visiting smaller locations which may be more remote. The CMFAA is happy to report that this program been very successful this past year and we look forward to continuing it in the 2019-2020 festival year. The 2019-2020 application will be on our website soon.
- 2) It is an ongoing desire for our organization to see all music educators hired for music festivals based on their qualifications. Our association continues to have very high standards of expectation in this regard. It is exciting to report that we have added approximately 60 new adjudicators over the past five years. These new adjudicators have been recommended as outstanding adjudicators by at least three local and provincial festivals across Canada. Consequently, we now have a roster of not only new adjudicators, but highly valued adjudicators with twenty to forty years of experience.
- 3) I have heard from festival administrators that our adjudicators are too expensive for some festivals to afford. First, regarding our recommendation that adjudicators be paid \$400 a day plus expenses we would like to remind all parties that these recommendations are simply that recommendations. Secondly, festival committees and adjudicators are welcome to negotiate whatever fee both parties feel is reasonable, and there is no penalty for either party to ask for or accept a lower fee.
- 4) I have also heard from a number of administrators that while they would like to use CMFAA Adjudicators more often, they find it challenging to search our website. The CMFAA is happy to announce that a password is no longer needed to search our website, and that on July 1, 2019, we will unveil a totally upgraded website. This new website will have many more features, including links to adjudicator websites and pictures, and will be more intuitively searchable. Check it out after July 1st.

As always, I am available for conversation and email to answer questions. The CMFAA is looking forward to working will all parties who are passionate about education in the arts over the next year.

Barbara Clark



The Kiwanis Music Festival - National Capital Region is pleased to sponsor a First Place Choral Award in honour of Barbara Clark.

In 2001, Barbara Clark was invested as a member of the Order of Canada. Her citation began with a short sentence, powerful in its truth: She instils the joy of music and singing in students, teachers and audiences.

Music has shaped almost every facet of her life. As a youth, Barbara sang in school and church choirs, and participated in music festivals. She moved from her hometown of Peterborough to Ottawa in 1959 for a teaching position at Manor Park Public School. In a flash of true serendipity, she was assigned to oversee the school choir. "This was a completely new experience for me—leading a choir, teaching songs."

With a career spanning half a century, she is perhaps best known as the long-time conductor of the Ottawa Children's Choir and founder/director of the Ottawa Regional Youth Choir .

By 1965, as Barbara was beginning her career with the Central Choir, other exciting opportunities arose. She became involved with the the Cantata Singers and the National Arts Centre Opera Chorus. She also gave workshops at home and abroad, and for 14 years was artistic director for UNISONG, an annual Canada Day celebration of music, written, directed and sung by Canadians.

Barbara believes a community's commitment to the arts is crucial. "The opportunity to take part in and to express oneself through dance, poetry, visual arts, and music is vital to a civilized society," she says before quoting famed music educator Bennett Reimer. "'Music is to feeling what reading is to thinking.' Perhaps it is the feeling aspect that is so crucial today. Music brings people together.

Florine Després

The New Brunswick Federation of Music Festivals is pleased to sponsor an elementary school choral award in honour of Florine Després.

A seasoned musician, Florine Després has influenced hundreds of students. She first taught music at St Joseph's Convent and in Grand Falls, NB. After obtaining a Bachelor of Music, she continued her career at Notre Dame d'Acadie College, where, under the name of Sister Lucienne, she, along with a religious companion, founded the NDA School of Music, where she worked from 1949 to 1965 as a piano teacher and choir director. Under her direction, the choir won the Lincoln Trophy [National Music Festival], the Canadian emblem of excellence in choral singing, five times. She has also prepared song books for public school students in New Brunswick. From 1968 to 1982, she taught at the École Normale and at the Université de Moncton where she was professor in music education in the primary and high schools.

Ms. Després studied at Mount Allison University, in Saint Joseph, Laval, Quebec and the prestigious Vincent d'Indy School in Montreal. In 1981, the Université de

Moncton awarded her an honorary doctorate and in 1984, Mount Allison did the same. Many other recognitions were also given to her including the Queen Elizabeth II Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002.

In a tribute to Ms. Després during a Thanksgiving Mass for her, a long-time friend said: "Win five Lincoln trophies, receive two honorary doctorates, be elevated to the rank of Knight in the French Order of Arts, have a room in the Faculty of Education named in her honor to emphasize that she passed on to the future teachers her passion for the teaching of music. No, we do not succeed if we are not the salt of the earth and a salt of quality, yes of great quality". Throughout her life Florine knew how to weave links of strong and permanent friendships.

Prudence Drake

Prudence (Ings) Drake, my grandmother, was a truly remarkable lady; a "true artist" in the real sense of the word. Growing up on a farm overlooking Pownall Bay in rural PEI, she was given music lessons on both violin and piano, the results of which were a huge part of her life. At many local functions, she accompanied my grandfather, a well-known island fiddler, on both piano/guitar. She played classical violin, was church organist and/or choir director well into her 70's.

Prudence painted beautiful pictures, sewed and created clothing, handmade quilts, hooked mats, and other handiwork. She decorated elaborate wedding cakes which were in high demand and that made their way as far away as Boston. When I played my undergraduate recital at Mount Allison University, she arrived with a grand piano cake for the centre piece at the reception following.

When she gave up doing her wedding cake business and choir, Gramme Prue took up pottery, cresting all her works "by hand", shunning the use of a potter's wheel. Shortly after her death, her work was featured for several months at the Confederation Art Gallery.

Prudence was a true Renaissance lady who was bigger than life and ahead of her time in many ways. Her music, artistic endeavours and family were her passions in life. She truly was a role model for our family as well as for others, and was a key figure in my musical development. What a pleasure it is to remember and honour her memory with a National Music Festival Award.

Ron Murdock, the broad smiling, skinny kid from Merigomish made his debut at the New Glasgow Music Festival as a young teen and always credited his early training and love of singing to Vivian Brand. His music festival days gave him encouragement and experience to move on to Mount Allison University and with Nova Scotia Talent Trust awards continued his studies in Montreal with the renowned baritone, Bernard Diamant.

We studied together in those years and Ron's passion for his singing and enthusiasm for life was contagious. We were soloists in the same choirs with highly acclaimed directors, as well as solo performing, studying German and sharing the struggles of young singers. In those days, Ron taught school music in Montreal and always said that is what kept him sane. He loved teaching young children and believed strongly that ALL children were 'born to sing". He felt singing was as natural as breathing or skipping for a child.

There was always a restlessness in Ron wanting to understand the art of singing more fully. He had a unique curiosity, inquisitiveness and persistence as a young singer. This led him to study with Frederick Husler and Yvonne Rodd-Marling in Switzerland and he thrived under their leadership. His musical journey continued in London where his career blossomed performing in recitals, concerts, and with

opera groups. Ron had an innate ability to communicate and interpret his music with a lyrical ease and beauty. For me, it was particularly so in his interpretation of the German Lied.

For Ron, singing was a gift integrating mind, body and spirit so the Alexander Technique became central to him in his teaching and performing. His life experience as a student of the voice is chronicled in a very informative, instructive book "Born to Sing: A singer's journey toward mind-body unity". This, along with the Awareness Teaching Centre in Nijmegen, Holland which he started with his wife, Nadia Kevan, will continue his work. His love of life and appreciation of beauty will live on in his children Andrew and Esther and all his friends.

As we celebrate and give thanks for Ron Murdock, singer, teacher, mentor and friend, let us continue to support all the young musicians who are beginning their journey in music festivals, local concerts, churches and schools. Let us nurture and encourage them in Ron's memory. A song by Purcell we used to sing comes to mind:

If music be the food of love
Sing on, sing on, sing on
'Til I am filled, with joy
For then my listening soul you move...

Despite the double events and no precedent to guide them, Executive Director, Doris Lazecki, her conscientious and competent Assistant Sandra Donison, and a host of hard-working volunteers put together a highly successful Federation Conference and Festival



At the Federation Annual Banquet, Lieutenant Governor F. W. Johnson was guest speaker, and commented most eloquently on music and the part the festivals have played in the musical life of this province. His well-researched talk was most gratifying to the delegates from every province.

To the delight of the National performers, a barbecue was given for them, the informality, Saskatchewan hospitality, and the opportunity to mix socially made a most welcome addition to the performers' routine.

The Federation Conference and the National Music Festival were held at Luther and Campion Colleges, August 25-29, with large audiences attending. Guest artist for the Final Concert was internationally acclaimed saxophonist Paul Brodie, former Regina resident.

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

Following the competitons on Friday afternoon and Saturday, the adjudicators provide the competitors in their discipline with individualized feedback in a Master Class setting.

\$750 would sponsor the Master Class of a discipline. The sponsor will receive recognition in the official National Music Festival Competition program and signage in the venue during the Master Class sponsored.

Sponsor the Choral Discipline for \$2,500

The National Music Festival offers a recorded choral competition in ten classes for Canada's school and community choirs. Each year over 30 choirs compete in the various classes. \$2,500 would sponsor the Choral Competition. The sponsor will receive recognition in the official National Music Festival competition program, communication with choral directors and the choral press release.

Sponsor the Grand Award Reception only for \$2,500

\$2,500 would sponsor the Grand Award Competition Reception for competitors, adjudicators, delegates and the public following the Grand Award Competition. The sponsor will receive recognition in the official National Music Festival competition program and signage at the reception.

SASKATOON 2019 SOCIAL EVENTS FOR COMPETITORS AT THE NATIONAL MUSIC FESTIVAL

The National Music Festival offers social events for its competitors to help provide them with a well-rounded environment for the competition. These social interactions nurture the development of friendships between the participants that often last for a lifetime as they continue to cross paths as professional musicians.

Competitor Welcome Night - \$1,500

Competitors arrive on Tuesday in time for a pizza supper followed by an evening meeting where they are briefed on what to expect over the next few days of competition and a review of important rules governing the competition. Mixer games complete the evening to facilitate the competitors getting to know one another.

\$1,500 would sponsor this opening evening of the Festival. The sponsor will receive recognition in the official National Music Festival competition program and signage at the event.

Fun Night - \$2,500

The Fun Night takes place after the completion of the first round of competitions. It is an important event that allows the competitors to relax after the intense schedule of rehearsal and performances. It allows them to experience some of the local culture and nurture the budding friendships they are making with their peers, as well as informal conversations with adjudicators.

The Saskatoon 2019 Host Committee is planning a dinner and dance - "Oh, What a Night! Swing Dancing with the Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra!". \$2,500 will sponsor the Saskatoon 2019 Fun Night. The sponsor will receive recognition in the Official National Music Festival Competition Program, communication with competitors and signage on site.

Competitor Lounge - \$500

The National Music Festival offers a lounge area for competitors to relax and mingle with their peers. The Saskatoon 2019 Host Committee will keep this stocked with snack foods, water and sodas.

\$500 will sponsor the Saskatoon 2019 Competitor Lounge for five nights. The sponsor will receive recognition in the official National Music Festival competition program, and signage in the lounge area.

Partial sponsorship at \$100 a night is also available.
