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2020 FCMF National Music Festival Cancelled Due to Current Global COVID-19 Pandemic

The Federation of Canadian Music Festivals [FCMF] Board of Governors and provincial delegates have made the very difficult decision to cancel the 2020 FCMF National Music Festival due to the current global COVID-19 pandemic.

In light of the federal and provincial guidelines for social distancing, many local music festivals have been required to cancel for 2020. This will undoubtedly affect plans for Provincial Music Festivals planned for later in the spring. FCMF is a grassroots movement. Without local and provincial levels of competition to recommend students forward, the FCMF National Music Festival is not viable in 2020, even if travel and social distancing restrictions are lifted by August.

We are aware that the youth participating, their teachers, their families and friends who are anticipating the FCMF National Music Festival will be disappointed with this decision. The festival is a musical highlight for the competitors involved. Each year it is a highly anticipated event.

As FCMF faces this uncertain and difficult time during the COVID-19 global pandemic, we continue to have ongoing expenses. If you are able to do so, please consider redirecting the amount of your annual donation towards operational expenses. All donations are eligible for a charitable tax receipt.

Planning is underway for the 2021 FCMF National Music Festival to be held in Sackville, NB the week of August 8-14. We look forward to serving Canada's best emerging artists through national competition in 2021 and beyond.

On behalf of the FCMF Board of Governors, I wish you good health and wellness in the weeks and months ahead. Thank you for your anticipated support and understanding.

Festival national de musique de la FCFM 2020 annulé en raison de la pandémie mondiale actuelle de COVID-19

Le Conseil des gouverneurs et les délégués provinciaux de la Fédération canadienne des festivals de musique (FCFM) ont pris la très difficile décision d'annuler le Festival de musique national 2020 de la FCFM en raison de la pandémie mondiale actuelle de COVID-19.

À la lumière des directives fédérales et provinciales afférentes à la distanciation sociale, plusieurs festivals de musique régionaux de 2020 ont dû être annulés. Ces annulations auront un impact inévitable sur la préparation des festivals de musique provinciaux un peu plus tard ce printemps. La FCFM est un mouvement communautaire. Sans les concours de niveaux régionaux et provinciaux permettant de recommander des élèves, le Festival national de musique de la FCFM ne pourra avoir lieu en 2020, même si les restrictions concernant les déplacements et la distanciation sont levées d'ici au mois d'août.

Nous sommes conscients que les jeunes qui souhaitent y prendre part, leurs professeurs, leurs familles et amis seront déçus par la décision d'annuler le Festival de musique national de la FCFM. Ce festival est un point culminant pour les concurrents qui y participent. Chaque année, cet événement est très attendu.

Alors que la FCFM doit faire face à cette période d'incertitude difficile concernant la pandémie mondiale de COVID-19, nous avons encore des dépenses courantes. Si vous le pouvez, considérez la possibilité de réorienter le montant de votre don annuel pour aider à couvrir les dépenses opérationnelles. Tous les dons donnent droit à un reçu aux fins de l'impôt.

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From the National Office

HIGHLIGHTS FROM SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING - March 7, 2020

As directed by the 2019 AGM, a Special General Meeting was held on Saturday, March 7, 2020 by teleconference.

- Acceptance of the 2020 Audited Financial Statements
- Approval of 2020-2021 Budget
- Delegates were informed that CRA has approved fiscal year-end change to March 31, as voted on at the 2019 AGM.

EMERGENCY GENERAL MEETING - March 21, 2020

An Emergency General Meeting was held Saturday, March 21, 2020 by teleconference to discuss how to move forward as the COVID-19 crisis unfolds. During this historic meeting, it was agreed unanimously to regretfully cancel the 2020 FCMF National Music Festival in light of the global pandemic.

Rationale: Many local festivals are cancelling and as a result some provincial festivals have also started to cancel. Without these festivals operating to recommend competitors to the National Music Festival, the festival is not viable in 2020.

2020 FCMF ANNUAL CONFERENCE and GENERAL MEETING

The 2020 FCMF Annual Conference and General Meeting is scheduled for August 9. Due to the cancellation of the 2020 FCMF National Music Festival, the meeting will be held by teleconference with times to be decided soon and communicated to Provincial Administrators.

2020 FESTIVAL ANNIVERSARIES AND VOLUNTEERS

With so many local festivals being cancelled this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, recognition of local festival anniversaries and volunteers is suspended for 2020 and will be resumed next year.

UPDATE OF TASK FORCE AND BOARD INITIATIVES

At the suggestion of the National Music Festival Task Force, and with the agreement of the NB Federation of Music Festivals Executive, the decision was made in early March to return to Sackville in 2021. The rationale for this was that for a number of years the idea of having a permanent or alternating location for the National Music Festival has been discussed. Having the NMF back in Sackville in consecutive years would have been a good opportunity to pilot this idea and collect data regarding possible benefits in raised profile and increased audience.

The plans and specific initiatives for the 2020 festival will be moved ahead to 2021, with dates being adjusted accordingly.


2021 FCMF National Music Festival, and Conference & AGM

- Conference Registration to include Welcome Supper, Fun Night and Grand Award Competition ticket in 2021 while maintaining same cost as previous years
- No fee for proxy vote
- No Federation Reception in 2021 piloting the idea to make volunteer and large ensemble announcements during Orientation Session. Rationale: more attendees, allows provincial competitors to cheer for their provincial winners, helps integrate the recorded competition with on-site competition, while saving money
- One day scheduled for Conference and AGM with another evening available, if needed
- Use of one adjudicator per discipline as approved at the 2019 AGM. To further reduce costs, it was agreed to pilot the use of existing adjudicators represented in chamber ensemble entries rather than hiring a separate chamber adjudicator.
- One day scheduled for Competitions [pending number of competitors]
- Longer masterclass time continued [half hour per competitor]
- Career development presentation[s] for competitors continued
- Professional development presentation[s] for delegates

- Welcome Night Pizza Supper, Campus Photo Scavenger Hunt, Orientation Session, Large Ensemble and Festival/ Volunteer Recognition
- Fun Night BBQ Chicken Dinner and Casino Royale
- Working on performance opportunity for Grand Award Winner with orchestras should be finalized soon

Future Planning

- Detailed Timing Policy was created to increase transparency and accountability, and added to the P&P Manual
- CRA has approved the new fiscal year end of March 31
- Working on finalizing locations for 2022 and 2023 two provinces are interested
- Governance Task Force on track to have wording of required By-law changes to implement 2019 AGM decisions ready for next Board of Governors meeting
- Governance Task Force and Finance Task Force reviewing the hosting model
- Governance Task Force reviewing and updating the Hosting Manual
- Governance Task Force working on a Board Self-Evaluation to be implemented 2020
- National Music Festival Task Force working on a survey of young Canadian musicians and their interest/perception/ feedback of the music festival system in Canada. Purpose: gain information on ways to include this demographic in the Federation as per consensus at the 2019 AGM
- Investigating and making new contacts re fundraising
- Addition of non-board and non-delegate members, all of whom are/have been involved in their local or provincial festival, to Task Forces
- Establishment of Advisory Council with people outside of FCMF workings for additional input and expertise
- Syllabus Task Force recommendation to change Syllabus wording from "at least two/three/five advanced selections" to "at least two/three/five selections performed at an advanced level", throughout the document, was approved.
- Syllabus Task Force recommendation to add a junior level class in one discipline piano for the 2021 National Music Festival, pending sufficient funding, was approved. Finalized class requirements are to be presented at the 2020 AGM using the proposed age limit [14-18 years/high school] and repertoire level [Conservatory grades 8-10 level].


Planned Giving

In Memoriam

Steven Paul Fielder November 21, 1950 - October 26, 2019



On October 26, 2019, Steven died peacefully in the arms of his twin sister Susan at the Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre in Barrie. He is the beloved son of Shirley Fielder, brother to Randy Fielder, and brother-in- law of Susan's husband, Garry Burke. Steve adored, and was very proud of his niece Lee Fielder, and nephew Dan Fielder (Monica). He was predeceased by his father Frank Fielder (2008).

After graduating from the University of Waterloo and the University of Western Ontario (London, ON), Steve studied music for three years at Durham University in England. He also took every opportunity he could to travel, visiting many countries around the world.

Steve believed very strongly in supporting and encouraging young musicians. He taught in London at both the Western Ontario Conservatory of Music and later at Conservatory Canada where he developed the theory program as well as coauthored the books Conservatory Canada: Theory for Students. Guests at the former Grosvenor Club enjoyed Steve's dinner music for over 25 years, and he also taught piano privately before moving to Oro-Medonte.

Throughout his career Steve was actively involved in Kiwanis Music Festivals. He

served as President of the Ontario Music Festivals Association for several years, and was on its Board of Directors for over 20 years. In 2010 he was the President of the Federation of Canadian Music Festivals Association. More recently he was the Executive Director of the Barrie Music Festival Association, and Past Lieutenant of Kiwanis International –Division 8, (Eastern Canada and the Caribbean), as well as President of the Kiwanis Club of Kempenfelt Bay, and Director of Programming for the Ottawa Kiwanis Music Festival for five years before retiring in 2017.

A Celebration of Life was held at Bonaire Golf Club, 1699 Woodrow Road, Coldwater ON, LOK 1EO, on Sat. November 9, 2019 from 1 to 4 pm, with Words of Remembrance at 2 pm.

Having started his professional life as a physics and math teacher, he progressed through various levels of administration to become the Superintendent of the St. Albert Protestant School District from 1989 to 1996. A lifelong Rotarian, Larry was the Charter President of the St. Albert and Fort McMurray Rotary Clubs and District Governor of District 5370 from 2001 to 2002. Larry was an active member of every community he belonged to, serving as the Commanding Officer of his Air Cadet Squadron in Grande Prairie, President of the Alberta Music Festival Association and the St. Albert Rotary Music Festival, Chair and Treasurer of the board of Atsikana Pa Ulendo (APU) Malawi Education Foundation, and Chair of the board of Cantilon Choirs. Larry was an early adapter of computer programming and developed software programs to manage data for charity auctions and music festivals across Canada. He gave selflessly of his time, knowledge and energy to these endeavours, developing deep friendships along the way.

Larry's interests and hobbies were diverse and numerous. He loved fishing, playing chess, playing bridge, singing and listening to choral music, woodworking, camping, and tinkering on the old Greyhound Bus that he converted into a family RV. Upon retirement, he, with the help of Donna and his girls, designed and built his own unusual home out in the country that could accommodate his converted Greyhound Bus, his large woodworking shop and Donna's extensive garden.

Larry's passion for music, education and service will be honoured by way of donations towards his daughter Heather's choral music program, the Cantilon Choral Program, Edmonton, and his daughter Christie's school for girls, Atsikana Pa Ulendo School for girls in Malawi.

Larry will be remembered for his humanity, integrity, sense of humour, and keen intellect. If a man's life can be measured by how many loved him, there could have been no bigger life.

David Liam Roberts [Winnipeg Music Festival, MB] was the NRS Foundation Grand Award Winner at the 2018 FCMF National Music Festival in Sackville, NB. In addition to \$5,000 from the NRS Foundation, he received a performance opportunity with the New Brunswick Youth Orchestra.

David Liam was scheduled to be featured Sunday, March 15 in concert with the New Brunswick Youth Orchestra for their season finale at the Empire Theatre in Saint John, NB. Unfortunately this concert was cancelled at the last minute on advice of NB's Chief Medical Officer in order to avoid the risks associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. David Liam, cellist, was scheduled to perform Schumann's *Cello Concerto* under the direction of NBYO's conductor, Antonio Delgado. Don Matheson, NBYO's Chief Operating Officer, has confirmed they are working at re-scheduling the performance in an upcoming season.

Naomi Ford [Greater Moncton Music Festival, NB] was the NRS Foundation Grand Award Winner at the 2017 FCMF National Music Festival in Ottawa, ON. Ms. Ford was the first FCMF Grand Award Winner to be offered an orchestral performance in addition to the \$5,000 from the NRS Foundation through the Victoria Foundation.

Naomi was scheduled to be featured on Saturday, April 4 as soloist when the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra performed Mozart's *Flute Concerto* under the direction of SSO's Eric Paetkau. The concert which was to take place at Knox United Church in Saskatoon, SK, has unfortunately been cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Carrie-Ann Matheson

Editor's Note: Carrie-Ann Matheson was First Place Piano Winner at the 1995 FCMF National Music Festival, representing PEI. She was recently interviewed by Joseph So, with the article appearing in Opera Canada, Spring 2020, Vol 60 #3. All information and most quotes are taken from that article, and appear within this article with permission. The quotes marked [] were supplied by Carrie-Ann in an email.

Carrie-Ann Matheson grew up in Charlottetown, PEI. As a young teen she studied with Jon Kimura Parker at the Banff Centre, then with his teacher, Marek Jablonski, at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto. During a year at McGill, she studied with Dorothy Morton. "I wasn't the most disciplined student in those days, and my parents wisely decided that it would be better for me come home to PEI. I returned to study with Dr. Frances Gray, who was the head of the piano department at UPEI. Dr. Gray was largely responsible for building my pianistic technique, and I'm incredibly grateful to her. After UPEI, I moved out west and spent a year studying with Dr. Robin Wood at the University of Victoria. It was there that my love of chamber music was truly born, and where I gave my first official coaching to an opera singer and took my first steps into the big world of opera. It was around the same time that I met Marilyn Horne, who turned out to be one of the most influential people in my life."

"The yearly music festival in Prince Edward Island was crucial to my development as a young pianist. Not only did it give me a clear goal each year, it provided the opportunity to be evaluated by, and receive really valuable feedback from, some of Canada's most prominent musicians." [*]

Winning the piano division of the 1995 National Festival remains a defining milestone in my career, as it gave me a much needed boost to move forward in setting new goals for myself both as a musician and as a person. I will never forget Janina Fialkowska's observation in the moment she announced me as the first prize winner. She said that my most important strengths as a performer were my ability to communicate and take risks. I have gone on to build my career on those very

qualities. I am forever grateful to the National Music Festival for giving me the confidence to keep walking down that path." [*]

Although Carrie-Ann started as a solo pianist, she found that her personality was better suited to collaborative work where she can "actually share energy with others". Carrie-Ann's philosophy is to bring out the best in each singer that she works with. "She started out wanting to be a psychologist, before being 'sidetracked' into a life in the arts" and brings some of those insights into her work. One of her passions is to coach young singers at the beginning of their careers.

In the interview with Joseph So, Carrie-Ann shared what she considered to be the best piece of advice given her by sharing a quote from pianist Warren Jones. "A singer's instrument is their body; if something is not right with their singing, then their life is not easy. If something is not right with their life, it affects their body and their singing is not easy." She has a lot of respect for singers and their courage "to stand in front of an audience and face forward".

After working as part of the music staff at Metropolitan Opera for several years, Carrie-Ann accepted an invitation from Fabio Luisi [Zurich Opera Music Director] to join the Zurich Opera in the 2014-2015 season as assistant conductor and vocal coach. A combination of personal and professional reasons prompted the move – she likes new challenges, wanted to see what life in Europe was like, met her husband, bass David Soar around that time and he was doing a lot of work in

Europe. Taking a year's sabbatical from the Met, she headed off on a new adventure which continues to 2020 as she is still living in Switzerland.

While in Europe, Ms. Matheson enjoys the challenge of "working on a number of very different projects, from standard repertoire to really challenging contemporary music." She has also has the opportunity to play early period instruments and works. Carrie-Ann's job includes being a rehearsal pianist and she is an active recitalist with renowned singers and instrumentalists.

Although a Canadian, most of Carrie-Ann's career has been outside of Canada but she has worked with many Canadian artists. "I would love to work in Canada, but the timing has just never been right."

Carrie-Ann's advice to young singers – "start learning languages now. One of the things that I care about the most is that we, who work in training young musicians, that we need to turn out complete people from these programs, not just people who know how to play the piano or how to sing beautifully ... It's more than complete artists, it's complete people. That's a really important thing – you have to learn how to function as a responsible human being. If you're a singer, you are going to be spending a long time away from your family, in hotel rooms. You need to learn how to live like that. You need to learn to take care of your psychological and physical well-being. We don't take good enough care of ourselves."

"My career is nicely balanced between performing in recitals with wonderful artists, working in the opera house as a coach/ pianist, working with talented young artists and the occasional conducting gig. If I could do it all over again, I probably

would have paid better attention in my language and music theory classes, so I didn't have to learn all that stuff later in my life!"

From the History Book

The City of Lincoln Trophy [Choral]

"This [1948] was an important year for the music festival movement in Canada. The very first national competitions was instituted that year for the best adult choral performance which the British choral adjudicator had heard while judging at the main Canadian festivals. To honour such achievement, the Lincoln Music Festival of Great Britain, through adjudicator Dr. Gordon Slater, presented the beautiful oak and silver City of Lincoln Trophy. At the first competition for the trophy in 1949, Vancouver's Bach Choir was the winner." ^[1]

The trophy was cut from 700-year-old cathedral oak and bears minutely detailed representations in silver of two views of Lincoln Cathedral. One shows the Cathedral from Vicar's Court and the other view labelled as St. Hugh's Choir. The plaque on the front of the trophy reads "The wood from which this casket is made was cut from timber formerly used in the roof of St. Hugh's Choir, Lincoln Cathedral which was built between 1186 – 1200". The casket is topped with a



silver carving depicting the Cathedral while the reverse side of the box bears the City of Lincoln Coat of Arms adorned with intersecting silver leaf branches. The plaque on the reverse side reads "City of Lincoln Challenge Trophy presented to the Canadian Music Festivals by The Lincoln Music Festival 1948". The trophy was originally given to the Manitoba Festival, but on recommendation from George Mathieson, Secretary of the Manitoba Festival, it was offered for national competition.

The first conference of the newly formed Federation of Canadian Music Festivals was held 1950, in Banff, Alberta.^[2] During this conference, "Herbert Turner raised a hornet's nest by suggesting that adult choral performances be taped and then judged by a panel of adjudicators. Current practice was for the choral adjudicators to choose the winning choir for the City of Lincoln Trophy following the completion of the festival tour, having heard each choir during the preceding weeks.^[3] Although the idea of choirs submitting recordings was raised several times in the ensuing years, "the practice [of recording choirs] was finally introduced for the 1960 season.^[4]



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The City of LIncoln Trophy was initially awarded to the best adult choir heard by the 'chain of adjudicators' as they travelled across Canada. The requirements for eligibility changed over the years as more trophies were added and live performances were replaced by taped performances. At some point in time it became the Male Choir Class.

City of Lincoln Challenge Presented to The Canadian Music Festivals The Lincoln Music Festival. 1948. -



In the early years, the City of Lincoln trophy was engraved and shipped to the winning choir's festival where it was presented to the choir. As the years went by, shipping the trophy was replaced with sending a smaller engraved silver rose bowl. The 1980 Digest states that due to extraordinary rise in cost of silver, the rose bowl would be replaced by a piece of art or sculpture. As more choral classes and awards were added, recognition took the form of engraved plaques, then certificates that were mailed to the Director. At the 2018 AGM, the City of Lincoln Choral Class was retired.
